Order an Energy Audit and Help HRRC

Home Repair Resource Center is once again partnering with **Dominion East Ohio's Home Performance with ENERGY STAR Program** to benefit both homeowners and HRRC. Dominion East Ohio residential gas customers benefit from a "deep discount" on the cost of the audit (normally a \$500 value), paying only \$50 for the 3-4 hour energy assessment.

And, HRRC will receive a donation from GoodCents, the company providing the audits, for all orders placed between October 10th and November 10th where HRRC is specified as the referring organization. Audits can be ordered online at <u>www.deoenergysavers.com</u> or by calling (877) 287-3416.



During the home energy assessment, a BPI-certified auditor from GoodCents performs an array of tests, installs some free home improvements, and prioritizes measures that will make the home more comfortable and energy-efficient. The owner can also get a rebate on improvements made as a result of the audit.

Cleveland Heights homeowner David Jorgensen was very pleased with the audit done at his home. "It was well worth the cost. The airseal test and infrared camera images were very helpful, and the

way the auditor checked the furnace gave us a lot of information about how it was performing. He was even able to fix the backdraft on the water heater on the spot - a carbon monoxide risk that we were completely unaware of." David has already caulked some air leaks that the auditor identified around the windows, and will be hiring a contractor for additional measures suggested in the audit.

About 100 area homeowners placed orders for energy audits that benefited HRRC in the last year. For details, about the program, go to <u>www.deohpwes.com</u>.

Women's Repair Course Expanded

HRRC's Home How-To for Women program is now available to all women homeowners who want to gain confidence and experience in home repairs. The newly-redesigned curriculum has four modules, each made up of eight two-hour classes held in our Teaching Center. The modules – Home Maintenance 101, Carpentry, Electrical, and Plumbing – can be taken in sequence or individually.

The final module for 2012, Plumbing Repairs, will start in November, break for the holidays, and continue in January. Senior Repair Program Added

Perhaps it's a widow struggling to deal with home repairs after the death of her husband. Maybe an elderly neighbor confided that getting bids for a new roof is really confusing him. It might even be your parents, who fear that increasing physical limitations may make it impossible for them to stay in the house where they've lived their entire married life. We all know seniors who need a little help in order to maintain their homes.

Thanks to grants from the McGregor Foundation and the United Black Fund, HRRC has added a special program to help seniors deal with home repair issues. Through our Senior Repair Program, homeowners age 62+ can get personalized assistance in assessing their repair needs and contracting repairs. Participants can benefit from:

- 90-minute home inspections to assess and prioritize repair needs and "aging in place" issues
- help with reviewing contractor estimates
- inspection of completed work
- special workshops for seniors

Wesley Walker, HRRC's new Senior Repair Specialist, has worked for years with owners of older and historic homes, especially in the areas of energy efficiency upgrades. He is an experienced teacher and presenter, skilled at transforming complex concepts into understandable terms for any audience.

Wesley is eager to help seniors plan ahead so they will be able to remain in their homes in future years. He reflects, "Every year thousands of seniors must leave their homes because their physical abilities can no longer overcome the barriers that are designed into their homes. Thoughtful planning now can create an environment that adapts to your changing physical abilities. A well-planned adaptive environment can add years to one's ability to live at home safely and independently."



Homeowners pay a modest program participation fee. Residents of Cleveland Heights, University Heights, and South Euclid can attend one class and receive a 90-minute in-home repair consultation for \$25. Residents of other communities may attend one class and receive a 90-minute consultation here in our office for \$35. John Sobotincic Receives 2012 HouseMender Award

Soon after John Sobotincic and his wife Marilyn relocated to Cleveland Heights from Medina in 2009, he contacted HRRC to volunteer. Could we, he asked, use his skills in woodworking, carpentry and home electricity? Little did he know that he would fill so many of our needs.

John's first involvement was with HRRC's *Home in the Heights* subsidiary, where he served as a volunteer for the Berkshire Road rehab project. He also became a member of the *Home in the Heights* Advisory Board.



John then agreed to share his skills and expertise as a volunteer instructor for our Project Repair and Home How-To for Women programs. During the last 1-1/2 years, he has taught ten different carpentry and electrical classes for HRRC.

Most recently, John (and friend Al Kuntz, whom he recruited to help) added a panel to the room-size module in our Teaching Center, where workshop participants can learn to repair and replace wood siding and shingles.

John has never refused to help HRRC, and he has stepped up more than once when we needed someone at the last minute. At our June 26th Annual Meeting, John Sobotincic was not only elected to the HRRC board of directors, but was also – in recognition of this remarkable dedication – presented with the 2012 **HouseMender Award**, given to those "whose spirit and actions exemplify the values and mission of Home Repair Resource Center."

In memoriam: Charlie Ault

The importance of **Charles R. Ault** to Home Repair Resource Center cannot be overstated. Not only did he help to found our organization forty years ago, but his passion for justice, coupled with his legal and business experience, led him to help create our Challenge Fund Loan Guarantee – a program that has facilitated some \$5.5 million in repairs to the houses of Cleveland Heights.

Charlie passed away on August 31st at the age of 89, but his legacy continues in the work that we do. HRRC Board President Alex Pesta perhaps said it best in his letter to the *Heights Observer* and *Patch:* "His mission was one of empowerment, education, and compassion.... His legacy of social justice, housing rights and home maintenance will be carried on by the HRRC."

Donations made to Home Repair Resource Center in Charlie's memory will be used to continue the work Charlie started back in 1971.
